WHEREAS, the notice of public hearing was published in the Foster County Independent; and WHEREAS, the District held a

public hearing on September 29, 2022, to hear public comments regarding the proposed Project and preserved a record of the hearing in the District's minutes of the meeting; and

WHEREAS, the District tallied the votes after the October 11, 2022, deadline passed and found that out of the 420,105.11 votes received, 312,373.61 (74.35%) votes were filed in favor of the project, and 107,731.50 (25.65%) of the votes were filed against the project; and

WHEREAS, the District found that the proposed drain will not

cost more than the amount of the benefits to be derived therefrom;

NOW. THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Project is hereby legally established and ordered consistent with the record of proceedings on file with the District and that the District Counsel shall cause notice of this order to be published in the Foster County Independent; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the District Engineer and District Counsel shall proceed with the advertising of bids for the construction of the Project consistent with procedures under North Dakota law upon the expiration of the appeals period for this establishment order; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a public assessment hearing shall be noticed and held on December 6, 2022, beginning at 8:00 a.m. or shortly thereafter as the agenda allows, in the Navajo Room of the Chieftain Conference Center, 60 4th Avenue South, Carrington, North Dakota 58421.

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED that any person whose land is assessed or may be assessed or is condemned or may be condemned for the construction of the Project may appeal to the district court from this order, under the procedures found in N.D.C.C. §§ 61-21-18 and 28-34-01.

All hay bales on North Dakota highway rights of way, must be removed by Tuesday, November 1. Hay bales remaining on rights of way after November 1, will be removed as directed by the District Engineer.

The bales need to be removed for snow management and safety reasons. North Dakota Century Code prohibits hay from being placed in the right of way except on the outer edge. Large round bales must not be placed on in-slopes or within 60 feet from the outside edge of the driving lane.

In addition to the costs of constructing the Project, by virtue of the creation of the Project and the Foster County Drain No. 1 Assessment District, the District has discretion to levy an annual maintenance levy against the benefitted properties within the Foster County Drain No. 1 Assessment District as necessary in accordance with North Dakota law for purposes of maintaining and operating the Project. North Dakota law currently limits the annual maintenance levy to a maximum of \$4.00 per acre for agricultural properties. In addition, the District cannot simply levy maintenance levies continuously without utilizing the

maintenance dollars for purposes

of operating and maintaining the

Project; in fact, North Dakota law

limits the maximum amount of

maintenance dollars the District

may retain in the Project maintenance fund to the equivalent of six years of levies. Finally, as an additional safeguard for landowners within the Foster County Drain No. 1 Assessment District, by law, the District can only utilize maintenance dollars levied for purposes of operating, maintaining, cleaning out and repairing the Project; the District cannot utilize any of those dollars for any other projects or any other purposes. DAKOTA DATEBOOK Indian legend

There once was a legend of a young Chippewa boy, the son of a prominent chief, who was captured by the Sioux. Rather than ransom him, the Sioux would place the young lad at the front of a raid on Chippewa bands and rather than risk killing their chief's son, the Chippewa warriors would withdraw. For eight years, the boy remained among the Sioux and his captors had come to believe that he had lost all interest in his own tribe.

One morning, upon awakening, the Sioux Chief Iron Heart discovered that his daughter, who had been promised in marriage to a noble warrior, had sneaked out of camp during the night with the young Chippewa. The jilted warrior, learning of this treachery, immediately decked himself in war paint and started on the trail.

The lovers were overtaken on the hill near Medicine Lake in what is now Eddy County and the young warriors prepared for battle over the hand of the beautiful voung lady. Armed with dirk knives, the two combatants fought furiously and within a short period of time, both lay dead from their wounds.

The heartbroken maiden made her way to the shores of Devils Lake and on the high bluffs overlooking the south shore of the lake, dressed in her finest light deerskin dress, she sang a beautiful love song and wailed at the loss of her lover. After several days, she ascended Battle Ax Hill, and with her hair streaming in the wind, she threw herself into the waters of Devils Lake some two hundred feet below.

Legend states that each year, on this date, a mermaid appears and basks in the waters of the lake for a few hours, only to disappear once again for another year.

Legends are a curious blend of fact and fiction, and often it is difficult to separate the two, for on October 27 in 1900, Mr. J. M. Mulvey, while hunting near Medicine Lake, stumbled upon the skeletons of two young men and beside each lay a dirk knife.

On an early autumn day, across the bay from Fort Totten, some have claimed to hear the lyrical love song of the maiden. Possibly, ever so briefly, through the morning mist a form can be made out playing along the shore, or perhaps it's merely the white froth from the waves slapping against the rocks below Battle Ax Hill.


