At 3:30pm, Chairman Utke called the Foster County Commission meeting to order. Roll call included Commissioner Becky Hagel, Commissioner David Utke. Commissioner Pat Copenhaver and Commissioner Alan Scanson via phone. Also present was Foster County State's Attorney Kara Brinster, Auditor/Treasurer Ellen Roundy, Foster County Independent Reporter Nathan Price and Brandon Padilla from Butler.

The meeting began with approval of the minutes for the October 15th, 2024, regular meeting and October 15th, 2024, Public Hearing. Commissioner Hagel motioned to approve both sets of the minutes, seconded by Commissioner Copenhaver. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Auditor/Treasurer Roundy stated that Merle Munson was in regarding mowing at the James River Cemetery. Kent Hewitt also submitted a bill for mowing at the Riverdale Cemetery. Commissioner Hagel motioned to increase pay for Munson to \$1,000 and Hewitt to \$700, seconded by Commissioner Copenhaver. Roll call voted included:

Road Superintendent, Nate Monson, provided an update to the BOCC. The department has been busy durapatching many spots as harvest is in full swing and trucks are hauling. Border States has finished the Club Hall Road. They donated 296.75 ton to help with haul roads in Bucephalia and McKinnon Townships due to the process of grinding up the road for the project. Overall, an additional 910 ton was placed and worked into the road this fall once the project was completed. If there are problem spots on the Club Hall Road, they will get fixed in the spring. The Road Department plans to attend LTAP training at NDSU Extension later in the month.

Chris Thomas, EAPC, joined the meeting via phone. The work in the basement is coming along nicely. The expected move in date is still projected to be the first week of December. Heating to the building is still the top priority. Discussion was had on the electrical bill with no decision made.

Lisa Hilbert and Colleen Sweet. Public Health, requested an extension to be included in the counties WSI program. Discussion included rate changes that the county could incur if increased claims were made. The discussion will be tabled until the next BOCC meeting for

further information. Karen Evans, Tax Director, presented the BOCC with a con-

tract from Sidwell. Her recommendation would be to continue at the hourly rate of \$130.00/hour for any training hours over the course of with bid closing on December 16th

the next two years. Commissioner. Copenhaver motioned to approve moving forward with the contract at the hourly rate of \$130/hour for any training, seconded by Commissioner Hagel. All voted aye and the motion passed.

Commissioner Discussion included reviewing the township agreement contract and annual township allocation. Per conversations with Road Superintendent, Nate Monson, \$140/hour is still a competitive rate and the BOCC would like to see that continue for the next year along with the \$180/hour non-contracted rate. The county has provided allocations to the townships each year. Since starting the program, over \$500,000 has been sent to townships to help offset costs. Commissioner Hagel motioned to allot for each township receive \$2,000 for 2025, seconded by Commissioner Scanson. All voted aye and the motion passed. Commissioner Utke noted that a docusign contract was sent out for the bridge removal project for parties to sign. The Youthworks shelter agreement is up for renewal. Commissioner Hagel motion to sign up again with the Youthworks shelter agreement, seconded by Commissioner Scanson. All voted aye and the motion passed. Discussion continued with ordering office chairs for the new commissioner room. Commissioner Copenhaver motioned to order the purchase of eight chairs for the new commissioner room of the mesh back samples that have been tested, seconded by Commissioner Hagel. Roll call

Randy & Mary Bartlett, Randy & Darcy Dewald, Gordon Ebensteiner, Douglas Handt, John Ingerson, and Garrett & Taylor Matteson qualified for up to five-hundred dollars of PRC credit with mobile homes. Evans stated that the state did not have the process for mobile homes ready when the taxation process was ready. The basement woodwork is almost completed and ready for carpet. Roundy stated that the second level is still without heat and requested that be a priority. The first of the year is the new anticipated move in date. Lisa Hilbert and Holly Zieman,

Public Health, approached the BOCC as the extension for WSI request was tabled at the last meeting. Commissioner Hagel had spoken with representatives from WSI, and any claim filed would go against the county's rates. She noted that after December 14th the district could reach out to WSI to start the paperwork. Additional discussion included if the county wanted to carry any additional risk for employees that are no longer county employees. Ellen Roundy, Auditor/Treasurer provided an update to the BOCC on the General Election for Foster County. The canvassing board met on November 18th, 2024, and certified the county's results. A total of one-thousand, seven-hundred and twenty residents voted. Roundy was very pleased with how the election went and thanked everyone involved for their help and support. The delinquent tax sale was held earlier in the day. One property was sold in Grace City and not sold during the sale. Roundy has the parcel posted on the website and in the Auditor's office as it can be sold between regular tax sales. Roundy presented two quotes for an updated postage machine. One was for the current company, Dakota Business Solutions for \$142.00 per month and the other was for Dakota Mailing for \$138.00/month. Pros and cons of both quotes were discussed Commissioner Hagel motioned to accept the quote from Dakota Business Solutions, seconded by Commissioner Beumer. All voted aye and the motion passed. Commissioner Discussion in-

cluded reviewing updated policies

for key card, clothing and flextime.

The BOCC will review and provide any updates prior to the next meeting for approval. The 2025 commissioner committee reports were reviewed. Hazen School District may go device-free It's a trend gathering momentum around the nation,

and now Hazen is considering whether it is the right fit for its school district. During a school board meeting Nov. 11, Superin-

tendent Ken Miller discussed the possibility of Hazen becoming a "device-free school," which would make it a violation to use phones, interactive watches or any other device for communication and/or playing games throughout the school day.

"This has been kind of a nationwide initiative regarding kids using devices during the school day," said

Miller said the Hazen administration has done some preliminary research on whether this might be a good fit for Hazen, but more is needed.

Love Locks stationary planter on Main Street Individuals are encouraged to check out a new and

unique planter by the Kiosk at Fifth and Main in downtown Bottineau, which has been built with a unique legend about love. The planter is called the Love Locks Stationary

Planter and is the idea of Kathy McGhan, who recently put pencil to paper and then shared her idea with other community members to make it a reality. "The backdrop of the planter has a wired back drop which was designed to place padlocks on the wire which comes from the legend of Love Locks, or what is also

called Love Padlocks, which is a worldwide tradition where couples lock a padlock on a chained fence, gate, bridge or monument, and then throw away the key, symbolizing that their love is locked forever," said McGhan. According to Wikipedia, it is believed that Love Locks initially started over 100 years ago during World

War I in the Serbian town of Vrnjaka Banja at a bridge called Most Ljubavi, which literally means the Bridge From Serbia, the tale of the Love Locks spread across the world, placing locks on chained fences, gates, bridges

Mercer moratorium defeated

The Mercer County Commission on Nov. 6 defeated a motion that would have placed moratoriums on development of wind and solar energy, data centers and ore processing until July 2025.

Commissioner Jamee Folk said she wanted a mora torium and thinks the county needs to either review old ordinances or create new ones for these forms of energy.

Commissioner Travis Frey said he is fine with reviewing and updating the wind and solar ordinances if needed, but did not agree with a moratorium being put on wind and solar development in the meantime.

The Stanley City Council on Nov. 12 approved the first reading of a proposed moratorium regarding data centers and battery storage in the city limits and extra-

The city's planning and zoning committee has been discussing a potential moratorium, and Mountrail County currently has a moratorium in place as it works with a steering committee in response to recent requests. The county's planning and zoning committee was set to meet to discuss concerns about the facilities.

The city's attorneys drafted an ordinance for the city to consider, with the committee recommending that the city council hold the first reading at its Nov. 12 meeting.

Possible wolf killed near Halliday

Last month, an animal that has been identified as likely being a gray wolf was shot and killed near Halliday. Stephanie Tucker, furbearer biologist with the North Dakota Game and Fish Department out of Bismarck, said the animal was shot Nov. 3 by a hunter northeast of Halliday. Tucker said the hunter self-reported the kill after realizing the animal was likely a wolf.

"For the time being, we are assuming it is a wolf," Tucker said. She said DNA testing is still pending to definitively confirm this.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife is conducting the investigation, due to gray wolves being a federally protected

species. Tucker estimates that the wolf is a female, at two years of age or older and weighing roughly 70-80 pounds.

Tucker said wolf sightings are rare in North Dakota, but not unheard of, both west and east of the Missouri River. She said North Dakota Game and Fish receives around 20 wolf sighting cases each year, although not all are able to be verified if there is no photo of the animal. Gray wolves are listed as a federally protected species

under the Endangered Species Act. Despite population increases, the species is still considered endangered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
